

# Guidelines for the Authors

The MF Working Paper series contains economic papers of scientific character, authored or co-authored by the Polish Ministry of Finance staff as well as contributions by authors from academic institutions, economists and trainees, namely co-operators of the Ministry of Finance and presenting own research results on the seminars organized by the Ministry. Texts on macroeconomic and fiscal problems as well as covering the topic of integration with the euro area are preferred.

The Series aims at stimulating discussion as well as research development in scope of abovementioned problems. Of equal importance would be gaining comments and suggestions on papers that would be helpful for the purpose of their possible publication in reviewed journals.

MF Working Papers are published solely in an electronic format as PDF files.

The composition of the Editorial Board is the following: Sławomir Dudek (chairman), Tomasz Szałwiński, Dawid Pachucki, Joanna Bęza-Bojanowska, Karolina Konopczak, Magdalena Zachłód-Jelec, Paweł Kolski, Tomasz Mazur. The Series coordinator is Paweł Kolski.

1. Upon receiving a paper, the Editorial Board assesses whether it complies with formal requirements of the Series as well as whether it is a scientific paper. The assessment should not be understood as a review of the article.
2. A necessary condition for publication is presentation of the article during the seminar at the Ministry of Finance.
3. MF Working Papers are registered in RePEc/IDEAS. For the registration purpose, authors should fill in short information about the article that might be find here ([download file](#), [download example](#)). After saving in txt format, the file should be opened with the Notepad (it should

not be opened with the text editor like MS Word). The form should be filled-in and sent to the Editorial Board together with the paper by an e-mail to the address given below.

4. Articles should be sent in the PDF format to the following address:

5. The Editorial Board accepts unpublished papers.
6. Before publication authors should fill in a declaration concerning the copyrights, sign it and provide it to the Series Coordinator. The example of the declaration may be downloaded [here](#).
7. Articles should be in English. In exceptional cases papers in Polish might also be accepted, however they should contain an extensive abstract in English.
8. A paper might be composed in MS Word (Times New Roman font, 12pt size) or L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X (document class "article", A4 style).
9. Text should be 1.5 line-heighted with margins: left, right and top of 3.5 centimeters and bottom of 4 centimeters. Pages should be numbered with numbers positioned at the middle bottom of the page (page number should not be visible on the first page of a paper). Text should be justified. Titles and subtitles should be short.
10. First page of the manuscript must contain:
  - Title of an article
  - Autor(s)' name(s) and surname(s) as well as their affiliation(s) and e-mail addresses (written in the footnote)
  - Compilation date
  - Abstract of up to 150 words
  - JEL classification codes (Classification System for Journal Articles). Code might be checked [here](#).
  - Keywords (maximum 5)

- The following disclaimer (written in italic in the footnote): *The views expressed in this paper should be regarded as those of the author(s), and do not necessarily reflect those of the Ministry of Finance in Poland. Upon quoting, please refer to the source.*
11. Tables and graphics should be numbered consecutively in the body of the text. Mathematical formulae should be numbered consecutively throughout the manuscript against the right-hand margin of the page.
  12. References to publications should be positioned in the main text (not in footnotes) using parentheses, e.g.: *Blinder (1998) and Bernanke (2004) emphasize the importance...* or *...there are limits to how much information can be digested effectively (Kahneman, 2003; Winkler, 2002).*
  13. The list of references should appear alphabetically at the end of the main text (but before the Appendix). Each position of the list should be markedly separated from another one. References should appear as follows:
    - for monographs:

    - for published articles:  
Blanchard O. J., Summers L., (1987), Hysteresis in Unemployment, *European Economic Review* 31, 288-295.
    - for papers published in conference proceedings:  
Welfe W., Florczak W., (2010), Slowdown of the Polish Economy. Model-based Simulations, [in:] *36th International Conference MACROMODELS'2009*, [ed.:] W. Welfe, A. Welfe, Łódź, 21-40.
    - for a chapter in a book:  
Lütkepohl H., (2004), Vector Autoregressive and Vector Error Correction Models, Chapter 3, [in:] *Applied Time Series Econometrics*, [ed.:] H. Lütkepohl, M. Krätzig, Cambridge University Press, Cambridge, 86-158.

- for unpublished papers:
